Capital Campaign plans

For more than two years, our church leadership has been praying about, planning for and preparing to conduct a capital campaign to meet some of the on-going needs for our congregation. Over this time, the Session appointed a Facilities Task Force and an Organ Task Force to assess our facility and make recommendations for necessary repairs and improvements. Our building is more than 40 years old and has heavy use every day of the week as hundreds of people come for worship, meetings, classes, concerts and support. Such usage requires maintenance that is at times beyond the means of the annual budget cycle.

A Capital Campaign Committee was formed (made up of Joan Golden, Carl Locke, Jim Rumsey and Bob Stephens) to carry out the preliminary work to conduct a successful campaign. This spring, we engaged a consultant who helped us conduct a feasibility study to review the goals of this project with members of the congregation. At the June session meeting, the Capital Campaign Committee recommended the congregation undertake a campaign to raise \$800,000 to repair and improve our sanctuary organ, restore the parking lot, re-point and seal the exterior bricks, extend our mission outreach and establish a maintenance reserve fund.

The session has called a special meeting of the congregation for July 24, following the 11 a.m. service, to receive the report of the Capital Campaign Committee, hear recommendations of the Session and vote to approve the campaign's goals.

I am very thankful for the hard work of all those who took part in the various steps along the way. Reports compiled over the past 30 months are available in the church office. If you have any questions about the campaign, its preparation or goals, or would like more information, please see any member of the Campaign Committee, or Elder on the Session, or one of the pastors.

Adult Education summer schedule

The First Christians: The Formation of the Gospels

June 26 through August 14, Mary and Kent continue their popular adult class from last summer on *The First Christians*, exploring the remarkable story of the origins and challenges of the early church. This summer the focus will be on the Gospels, where they came from, who they speak for and their impact on the emergence of the first followers of Jesus.

The class draws from the award-winning PBS Documentary, *"From Jesus to Christ,"* as well as other sources. Using well-known Biblical scholars like John Dominic Crossan and Elaine Pagels, this video series helps bring our faith's history alive. This video introduces us to the personalities behind the gospels and the issues they confronted as they wrote their accounts of the life of Jesus.

Come and join us! Whether you know a little or a lot about the origins of the Christian faith, you will come away from this class with something new to think about. The class meets at 9:40 a.m. each Sunday in the Fireside Conference Room, **(and at 9 a.m. on July 31)**.

August 21 is the Annual Pancake Breakfast in Fellowship Hall NO Sunday School Class

August 28 bobbie-frances mcdonald will share more about her trip this spring to Germany to attend the Sudan Advocacy Action Forum, supported by PCUSA. (See article on page 5.) Class meets in the Fireside Room.

Beginning in the fall (September 11)

Earl Huyser will continue his lectures on Bible history and study in the Chapel.

Because there has been a strong interest in further Bible study, Pastor Mary begins a class entitled *"Feasting on the Word,"* a curriculum produced by PCUSA which follows the lectionary used by our pastors in preparing their sermons each Sunday. Scriptures from the book of Matthew will be followed and studied each week up to Advent (November 27). This class meets in the Fireside Conference Room at 9:40 a.m. each Sunday. We invite you to come to all or as many of these classes as you are able to attend.

Two other classes will be offered, depending on the interest of FPC adults:

1. *"Reclaiming the Bible for a Non-Religious World,"* lectures/sermons by John Shelby Spong presented this past spring in Omaha, NE during a Horizons of Faith conference. Participants will listen to Spong's theological presentations and then discuss his ideas. A five-week study in north Fellowship Hall.

or . . .

2. *"Eternal Life: A New Vision of Eternity,"* by John Shelby Spong. This is Spong's latest and probably last book. He writes about his understandings of what it means to go beyond religion, beyond theism and beyond heaven and hell as he looks at what it means to have eternal life. Spong once again puts emphasis on scientific method and the discoveries it yields to answer his questions. Books will be ordered (\$15 ea.).

Mission Giving

Your mission dollars at work

One of the local agencies which FPC supports through our Mission and Witness Committee is **Health Care Access (HCA)**, which helps meet medical needs of

uninsured residents of Douglas County. The following is taken from a recent letter from HCA addressed to the church: "One person whose life continues to be changed by your gift is Josie, a longtime patient and lifelong Lawrence resident, who, after 18 years as an employee of a local fast food franchise, has yet to be offered health care benefits. Under our care, Josie has battled heart disease, emphysema and diabetes, but manages her diseases with the help of our nurse practitioner, volunteer medical specialists, and medications, which she gets at little to no cost through our patient assistance program. While she has multiple chronic illnesses, she continues to be a productive and positive community member, a loyal employee, and because of the care she has received at Health Care Access, she is here for her two children. We appreciate your longstanding support. This helps so many patients!"

Health Care Access is just one of several local agencies which depend on regular support from FPC. We will continue to share their stories with you in future issues of the newsletter.

Another local agency which FPC supports through our Witness and Mission Committee is **Willow Domestic Violence Center**. In 2010 we donated \$1,000 to the Center (formerly Women's Transitional Care Services) to provide bus tickets to victims of domestic violence who found it necessary to leave the state in order to escape their abusers. To date eight adults and one child have received tickets for this purpose. These women were asked the question, "Does this ticket meet your safety needs?" Here are their responses:

- * Yes, I will be away from my abuser.
- * Yes, I will find safety from my abuser who has located me.
- * It will provide safety for my daughter and myself. We are fleeing from abuse and this will be my last day that they will look. I am trying to be a good parent and do right by my child and to remove us from harm is the only way I can be a good mother.
- * Yes, I am going to live with my son. My abuser doesn't know where that is and doesn't know my son's name.
- * Yes, it allows me to travel to my destination without feeling paranoid and looking over my shoulder or letting too many people know about my movement.
- * Yes, helping me to get out of my unsafe situation.
- * I will be able to make court appearances so that he will remain in jail. I will be in a place he does not know about.
- * This will put more than 1000 miles distance from my abuser. He will not know where I have gone and will not be able to find me again.

Sudan: Silently at War—Again!

Two days before the Sudan Focal-point Conference in Hermannsburg, I watched CNN and the BBC on my German TV continuously because they were the only stations in English. Both had horrific pictures of the burning of Abyei which along with the Upper Nile and Southern Kordofan are the three “contested areas.” These lands have not been designated as belonging to either the north or south of Sudan for decades but that was to have been settled before the referendum that resulted in the south becoming a new nation on July 9, 2011. It did not happen. There were reasons given for this but none of them were valid.

And in the case of Abyei, although both sides agreed to accept the results of an independent panel, when Abyei was declared to be part of what will become The New Republic of Southern Sudan the north refused to agree to it and demanded it be settled another way. Ownership of this oil-producing region, in which the north-linked tribe of Misseriya overlaps with the ethnically-southern tribe of Dinka Ngok throughout most of the year, was scheduled to be decided via a plebiscite in January. The vote, however, never materialized after north and south Sudan failed to reach an agreement on the criteria of who should qualify to vote as a “resident” of Abyei area. Subsequently, Abyei was seized by the north’s Sudan Armed Forces (SAF), and President Al-Bashir dissolved the region’s local administration and appointed a new administrator. So, in effect, what was on TV was Northern Sudan once again enforcing its rule via violence.

Then, while at our meeting with leaders from both the north and the south attended by humanitarians and advocates, a message came

in that the people living in the Nuba Mountain area of Southern Kordofan were being attacked by northern forces both on the ground and by air from MiG fighter jets. The Nuba are not prepared to defend against either of these kinds of assaults and many lives have been lost as well as people becoming displaced to escape certain death. This is a replay of what happened in Darfur and it still not settled.

At the time of this writing, mid-June, fighting broke out again in Abyei resulting in casualties. The increased violence comes less than a month before Southern Sudan’s secession. The sudden outbreak in violence on multiple fronts has greatly increased fears of renewed war, with some aid workers in the south indicating the northern government of Khartoum may be moving toward wider conflict.

The violence prompted President Barack Obama to issue a new warning to Sudan’s leaders. He singled out the Khartoum government saying, “it must prevent a further escalation of this crisis by ceasing its military actions immediately, including aerial bombardments, forced displacements and campaigns of intimidation.” Further he said, “if Sudan’s leaders choose peace, the U.S. will take steps to normalize U.S.-Sudan relations,” but Khartoum will face more pressure and isolation if leaders there “flout their international obligations.”

Instead of July 9 being a celebration, it may be the inauguration of another protracted war.

This is not the kind of beginning I have been praying for . . .

We are excited and immensely happy to announce that we have successfully completed our \$832,000 Ministry of the Hearth Capital Campaign. We just recently received the check for our \$119,000 capping grant from the Mabee Foundation in Tulsa, OK, which finished out our two year campaign.

We know that the success of this campaign is due to the generosity of a myriad of individuals, groups, congregations and foundations. Without their support, this successful campaign would not have been a reality.

With the funds raised we are able to complete critical building improvement projects for this building that is on the Local, State and National Register of Historic Places. More importantly, however, we are able to better prepare the building for use by hundreds of new students and a variety of community and ministry programs this fall.

Sun Safety Tips

You've been following the rules when it comes to sunscreen for how long now? At this point, you're a diligent daily sunscreen wearer, and you know to reapply every few hours when you're at the beach or pool. (*Sorry, no magical stay-all-day sunscreen on the market yet!*) It's 2011—some of the old thinking no longer applies. So, update your sun-safety habits.

Old rule: Apply a broad-spectrum UVA/UVB sunscreen with SPF 15 a half-hour before leaving the house.

NEW RULE: Sunscreen alone is not enough: Wear an SPF 15 (at least) plus an antioxidant-enriched moisturizer.

Here are the main points in the FDA's new sunscreen rules:

- Sunscreens may be labeled "broad-spectrum" if they provide protection against ultraviolet A (UVA) and ultraviolet B (UVB) radiation.
- Only broad-spectrum sunscreens with a Sun Protection Factor (SPF) of 15 or higher can state that they protect against skin cancer

if used as directed with other sun protection measures.

- Sunscreens with an SPF of 2-14 will be required to have a warning stating that the product has not been shown to help prevent skin cancer or early skin aging.
- The terms "sunblock", "sweatproof" and "waterproof" are no longer allowed on labels.
- A sunscreen may claim to be "water resistant"; however, the product must specify if it offers 40 minutes or 80 minutes of protection while swimming or sweating, based on standard testing. Sunscreens that are not water resistant must include a direction instructing consumers to use a water resistant sunscreen if swimming or sweating.
- Sunscreens cannot claim to provide sun protection for more than two hours without reapplication.
- Sunscreen manufacturers will have one year to comply with the FDA ruling; smaller companies will have two years.
- Ingredients in sunscreens marketed today have been used for many years and FDA does not have any reason to believe these products are not safe for consumer use.
- The FDA reiterated that sunscreen alone is not enough, and should be used in conjunction with a complete sun protection regimen, including seeking shade, wearing long pants, long-sleeved shirts, hats and sunglasses.
