“I was hungry... and you fed me.” Matthew 25

On several occasions this summer, Mary and I have drawn attention to the increasing number of requests we receive to help families pay an electric bill, buy some groceries or take care of some prescriptions. We are very thankful for your gifts that enable us to meet these needs. Since the beginning of the year, this congregation has provided over \$10,000 through our Deacons' Fund and the Pastor's Discretionary Fund to people struggling to make ends meet.

Let me share with you how we process the requests we receive so to assure that your generous gifts meet valid needs. First of all, we only respond to requests from members of our congregation or from an agency sponsored social worker in our county. We established this policy during my first year here at FPC. This means that we cannot respond to someone who calls the church or comes to the office looking for assistance. If someone asks us for assistance, we direct them to one of the social services in the community.

Second, we rely on social workers in the agencies we work with, such as the Salvation Army, Douglas Country Housing Authority, Bert Nash's homeless outreach workers, and others, to undertake a professional assessment of a client's need, to review possible sources of funding to meet those needs, and, if necessary, make specific request for our assistance. The majority of these requests are for less than \$100. Neither Mary nor I have the experience, training or resources to do this time consuming process. Occasionally, a social worker may realize that a potential client is speaking to more than one agency or is not being truthful about their need. When that is determined, the social worker gets in touch with us immediately to correct the error and return our grant.

Third, all checks are written to the utilities company, landlord, or receiving agencies. We do not give any grants directly to a client.

The Deacons' Fund is supported by the members of the congregation, and you may use the special offering envelope in the pews for your gifts. The Pastor's Discretionary Fund was at one time supported by an anonymous donor who gave up to \$6,000 a year. That gift ended about three years ago, and since then, this fund has been supported in the church's budget at \$3,000 a year. In addition to these funds, we administer the Lawrence Ministerial Emergency Fund, which is supported by several Lawrence churches and private gifts. This fund provides grants for people to pay rent deposits for their housing. Each year, this fund provides \$10-\$12,000 in support for housing needs.

In my 27 years of ministry, I have found this system to be the most effective in meeting the genuine needs of people and filtering out those who seeking to take advantage of our resources.

Many of us are aware that in the current political debate about government services and taxes, there is a movement toward providing social services by congregations and charities and not the government. From this small report, you can see what type of havoc such a change would be for the staff and resources of congregations, especially those who are much smaller than First Presbyterian Church.

Summary of Session actions

Regular Meeting October 11, 2011

The following actions were taken:

- Received monthly reports: Clerk, Financial, Deacons, Trustees, and Pastoral Staff.
- Received an update on both Stewardship and Capital Campaign pledges received to date.
- Approved a request from the Moderators to sell Home Depot gift cards on October 9 and 16, for use by Presbyterian Disaster Assistance in New Orleans.
- Approved a request from the Moderators for Girl Scout cookies to be sold in the narthex in November.
- Set October 16, following the 11:00 a.m. service, as the date for a special Session meeting for the purpose of receiving new members.
- Approved a request from the Moderators and the Capital Campaign Committee to request approval from the Presbytery of Northern Kansas and its Board of Trustees for FPC to secure a loan up to \$800,000 to cover the cost of the Capital Campaign projects.
- Approved a request from the Preschool Committee that the program be renamed "First Presbyterian Church First 5 Years."
- Approved a request from Bart Smith and Elizabeth Toland, to be married in the sanctuary of First Presbyterian Church, on May 27, 2012, with Rev. Dr. Janet DeVries, and John Leedy, co-officiating.
- Received reports from Ministry Areas.

All Saints Day

On Sunday, November 6 we will remember those members of the church who have died and gone before us by reading their names as a part of our prayer during worship. Those church members who have died in the past year will be on the list. If you would like to include a name on the list, friend or family, please let the office know by noon on Thursday, November 3.

Adult Education

Pastor Mary continues her class on "*Feasting on the Word*," a curriculum which follows the lectionary used by our pastors in preparing their sermons each Sunday. Scriptures from the book of Matthew will be followed and studied each week up to Advent (November 27).

Earl Huyser's class continues an examination of the events during the reigns of Kings Saul, David and Solomon, which is reflective of the development of the religion of the Israelites in the periods of their history when these Old Testament books were written.

A third class involving a book study, which is yet to be named, will begin in north fellowship hall on November 6. The class on "Eternal Life" by Bishop Shelby Spong ended October 30.

FPC Spirit, health and wholeness

November always seems to herald a busy time of year. Thanksgiving, the Christmas season and numerous social obligations find us running daily. It is a great time to remember that this is **National Family Caregivers Month** — a nationally recognized month that seeks to draw attention to the many challenges facing family caregivers and raise awareness about community programs that support family caregivers. Simply put, family caregiving is the act of assisting someone you care about who is chronically ill or disabled and who is no longer able to care for themselves. Family caregiving is the bedrock upon which this country’s healthcare system depends. The services provided by family caregivers represents 80 percent of all home care services and are conservatively valued at \$306 billion a year, more than twice the amount spent on paid home care and nursing home services combined. Unfortunately, there is nothing simple about family caregiving.

Caregiving in the 21st Century is fundamentally different than it was in the biblical times when the commandment to Honor thy Mother and Father was created. People died at a

much younger age and often times without the benefits of medication and the advanced medical technologies we see today. One thing that hasn’t changed however, are the common bonds that tie all family caregivers together. The typical family caregiver is a 46-year-old woman caring for her widowed mother who does not live with her. She is married and employed. Approximately 60 percent of family caregivers are women. Thirty percent of family caregivers caring for seniors are themselves aged 65 or older. If you know of someone providing caregiving, please take time from your hectic schedule to support their efforts by providing help or just a “break” from caregiving. Let’s be a truly “Caring Congregation”. We all need respite, and caregivers certainly have less than most of us. Reaching out to help would be a wonderful voluntary “gift of love” — maybe you can provide transportation, help with insurance or other paperwork, household support, regular meals. Trinity-In-Home Care provides “friendly visitors” for many of their clients. Sign up as a volunteer. AND caregivers— don’t forget that the Parish Nurse Ministry has durable medical equipment to loan.

Talk about the ultimate Caregiver!

November is also **National Hospice Month**. Hospice is an interdisciplinary team of health care professionals and trained volunteers dedicated to providing pain management, symptoms control, psychosocial support, and spiritual care to those living with life-limiting illness and their families. To learn more about what hospice can provide, go to www.nhpc.org. If you are so inclined, consider being a hospice volunteer. It may be one of the most rewarding volunteer services that you could perform.

Additionally, **November is National Alzheimer’s Disease Awareness Month**. Alzheimer’s disease is a brain disorder *continued →*

named for German physician Alois Alzheimer, who first described it in 1906. Scientists have learned a great deal about Alzheimer's disease in the century since Dr. Alzheimer first drew attention to it. Memory loss that disrupts daily life is not a typical part of aging and can possibly be Alzheimer's disease that causes a slow decline in memory, thinking and reasoning skills. Below are 10 warning signs of Alzheimer's. Every individual may experience one or more of these signs in different degrees. If you notice any of them, please see a doctor.

1. **Memory loss that disrupts daily life**—One of the most common signs is memory loss especially forgetting recently learned information. What's typical? Sometimes forgetting names or appointments, but remembering them later.
2. **Challenges in planning or solving problems**—Some people may experience changes in their ability to develop and follow a plan or work with numbers. What's typical? Making occasional errors when balancing a checkbook.
3. **Difficulty completing familiar tasks at home, at work or at leisure**—People with Alzheimer's often find it hard to complete daily tasks. What's typical? Occasionally needing help to use the settings on a microwave or to record a television show.
4. **Confusion with time or place**—People with Alzheimer's can lose track of dates, seasons and the passage of time. What's typical? Getting confused about the day of the week but figuring it out later.
5. **Trouble understanding visual images and spatial relationships**—For some, having vision problems is a sign. They may have difficulty reading, judging distance and determining color or contrast. What's typical? Vision changes related to cataracts.
6. **New problems with words in speaking**

or writing—Trouble following or joining a conversation. What's typical? Sometimes having trouble finding the right word.

7. **Misplacing things and losing the ability to retrace steps**—a person may put things in unusual places. What's typical? Misplacing things from time to time, such as a pair of glasses or the remote control.
8. **Decreased or poor judgment**—People with Alzheimer's may experience changes in decision making. For example, they may use poor judgment when dealing with money, giving large amounts to telemarketers. What's typical? Making a bad decision once in a while.
9. **Withdrawal from work or social activities**—The person may start to remove themselves from hobbies, social activities, work projects or sports. What's typical? Sometimes feeling weary of work, family and social obligations.
10. **Changes in mood and personality**—The mood and personalities can change. They can become confused, suspicious, depressed, fearful or anxious. What's typical? Developing very specific ways of doing things and becoming irritable when a routine is disrupted.

There is an accelerating worldwide effort under way to find better ways to treat Alzheimer's, delay its onset or prevent it from developing. To learn more please visit the Alzheimer's Association at www.alz.org.

Preschool fall fundraiser

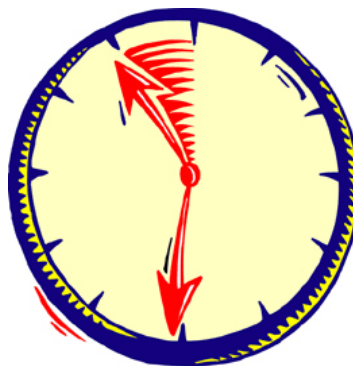
The FPC First 5 Years Preschool invites you to participate in their fall fundraiser by purchasing "**Butter Braid**" bread.

The ECO Team offers a variety of programs at FPC on how we can be better stewards of the creation.

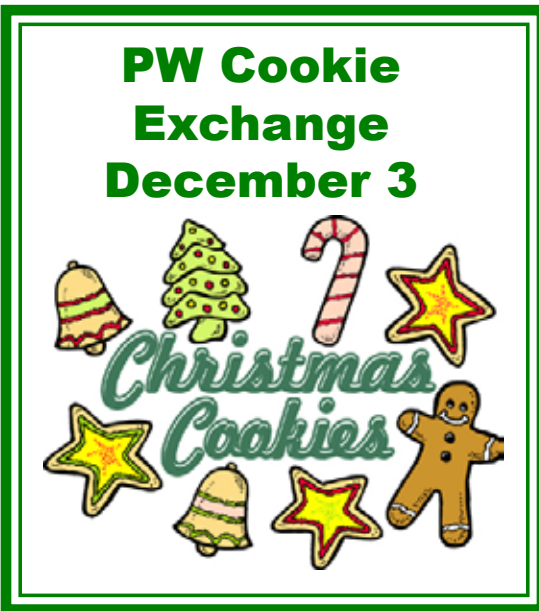


Presbyterian Women mission project
