

Lawrence Habitat for Humanity: Since the inception of the local nonprofit Habitat group in 1989, Lawrence Habitat has worked alongside 91 families including over 200 children to provide home ownership opportunities, with the help of thousands of volunteers from the community and across the country. FPC is a Lawrence Habitat Covenant Church and works closely with the faith community to fund and construct "Building on Faith" homes.

Family Promise: Family Promise of Lawrence is a non-profit, interfaith hospitality network providing temporary assistance, hospitality and case management for families with children experiencing homelessness, helping them take the necessary steps toward lasting independence.

Lawrence Community Shelter: The Lawrence Community Shelter is the only emergency homeless shelter serving Lawrence and Douglas County in Kansas. Their mission is to provide safe shelter and comprehensive services and programs that provide a path to a positive future for people experiencing homelessness and are at risk for homelessness.

Warm Hearts: Warm Hearts of Douglas County Inc. is a non-profit agency established to provide winter energy assistance to local households in need. Black Hills Energy matches donations given, and one hundred percent of the funds received provide assistance.

Health Care Access: A medical clinic that serves low-income, uninsured Douglas County residents, providing appointments, referrals, medications, X-rays, tests and health education. No federal funding is received. Essential medical care could not be provided without volunteers and donated tests and drugs.

The Willow Domestic Violence Center: The Willow Domestic Violence Center provides safe-shelter, peer counseling, advocacy and other services to survivors of domestic violence in Douglas, Franklin, and Jefferson counties. They help over 274 women and children with shelter and services every year.

FPC's First 5 Years Scholarship Fund: Our Preschool has been a leading early education program in Lawrence for over 35 years. The Preschool develops social and school readiness skills through a variety of enriching activities. Scholarships are provided to families who are unable to afford these vital building blocks for their child's future alone.

Seeds of Peace: Seeds began in 1993 by offering teenagers living in the conflicting regions of Israel and Palestine the opportunity to come together at the International Camp in Maine to build relationships, understanding and the skills needed to advance lasting peace. In a beautiful setting, the Camp provides a neutral, supportive setting for hundreds of young leaders from regions in conflict to meet their "enemy" face-to-face and learn that working for peace together is possible. Over the last 23 years, this program has equipped over 6,000 new leaders from 27 countries to contribute toward building peace.

Heifer International: Since 1944, Heifer has helped 13.6 million families in more than 125 countries move toward greater self-reliance through the gift of livestock and training in environmentally sound agriculture.

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance: Gathering support from Presbyterian Churches throughout the world, PDA provides assistance to disasters in the US and around the world. By gathering support in advance of a specific disaster, PDA is able to provide immediate responses when and where it is needed.
